





- ⁶ They will climb from height to height, * and the God of gods will be revealed in Zion.



Presider Lift up your hearts.


People We lift them to the Lord.

Presider Behold what you are.


People May we become what we receive.

We unite ourselves with you and embrace you with all our hearts, souls, and minds. Let nothing separate us from you; let us serve you in this life until, by your grace, we come to unending peace in your glorious kingdom. Amen.
